Treasurer's Report Star

The Plant Sale was as successful as last year making \$33,153. Costs for this year were about the same as last year. Square costs were basically the same.

SIG ended up being right on track with what Sue had predicted. We brought in \$6,175 \$6,200 was budgeted. We spent \$7,641.11 and \$7,680.00 was budgeted. All is as expected; the extra cost of the event is covered by Friends of YCMGA.

We have so far received \$1100 from Friends of YCMGA, \$1700 was budgeted, and all have not come in yet.

First Federal is having their rewards program this May. All First Federal Customers are encouraged to log in their hours.

"For every hour participating First Federal Customers volunteer, we'll contribute \$2 to the participating Yamhill County Nonprofit organization. The more time you volunteer, the more rewarding for your service. Participating Yamhill County nonprofit organizations are eligible to earn up to \$500 in any given year, with the total donation based on the number of active volunteer hours submitted by First Federal customers during the time the program is open. The First Federal Community Rewards program closes when the 10,000th hour of volunteer time is received. Contributions are based on the total number of hours submitted and are disbursed at the close of the program." Stated First Federal

Star would like to create an Assistant Treasurer position. A focus group was formed with Sue Nesbitt, Tom Canales, Gail Stolz and Susan Burdell.

Outside of school, she has held multiple positions of responsibilities in FFA and is this year's president. In this position she has excelled at planning events, organize teams involving multiple schools. She plans to enroll at California State Polytechnic University at Humboldt and major in Environmental Science, Management and Policy, hoping to contribute to ecologic restoration, sustainability, and positive change through research.

Kaylee has an outstanding academic record, will graduate with an honors diploma, multiple AP classes,

and has a 4.19 weighted GPA. She is a valedictorian candidate. She is currently conducting independent research on aquatic lead pollution.

Her activities are many and varied. She has been a 4-year 3/sport athlete in Volleyball, Basketball, and Softball. She volunteers in reforestation projects, beach cleanups, Zero Waste McMinnville Plastic Project, and promotes sustainability through a workshop teaching clothing repairs and organizing clothing swaps for her peers.

The next time someone says "Kids these day..." in that tone of voice, I would urge them to read about these truly exceptional young people. The future is in good hands if we help them grow and realize their dreams.

The committee is proposing \$2000 for each scholarship.

The two of the students from MAC High will be paid from the FFA funds. Their scholarships will be funded from the restricted account established when McMinnville's FFA program was discontinued approximately ten years ago. At this time there is \$5,885.29 in that account.

The 4 other students' scholarships will come out of the regular funds.

Sue made the motion to have \$12,000 approved for scholarships for the 2026 budget. Susan seconded the motion. The committee would like to introduce the students at the next Board Meeting June 11 at 10am.
